
# The Concierge TIPS FOR TOURING HERE AND ABROAD

Here's how to spend a relaxing 60th birthday on a gentle spring day along the St. Lawrence River: Steam, soak, sauna, soak, sandwich, soak.

To the list of must-try experiences Montreal is justifiably known for — bagels, poutine, jazz, hockey — add one more: Nordic spas.

Like most everything in Canada, taking the baths is surprisingly affordable, even before taking into account the 25 percent discount your US dollars get north of the border. A day in the pools ranges from \$39 to \$55 Canadian at Montreal's two options, the outdoor Strom Spa on L'Ile-des-Soeurs, or the urban, indoor Scandinave Spa in the historic Old Port sec-

Both feature hot and cold pools, a steam bath, a sauna, relaxation rooms, and lounge chairs to encourage the "hot-cold-relax" cycle of Nordic rejuvenation. Grab a robe, put away

all electronic devices, stop talking, and indulge.

Strom is a 15-minute drive from the center of town, but feels a world away. L'Ile-des-Soeurs, or Nuns' Island, is tucked just below the massive Champlain Bridge. For 250 years it was home to a congregation of Catholic sisters, until it was sold in 1956 to become a residential community. (The island is also home to a gas station designed by noted modernist architect Mies van der Rohe that has been converted into a community center.)

The spa, open year-round, has several hot and cold pools situated on the grounds, a dock for sunning oneself along the river and watching the wildlife, tents for massage treatments, and indoor space for steam bath and sauna, facial and body treatments, and a bistro. The best touch: bowls of eucalyptus oil on the heated rocks in the steam and sauna, giving that clean, Vicks VapoRub feeling in the lungs with a deep inhale. The massage tents, positioned near the shore, allow customers to listen to the natural sounds

of the birds chirping and calling in the reeds if they prefer it to canned New Age music.

At Scandinave Spa downtown, the vibe is a little hipper. The cold pool and shower felt icy cold — a quick plunge is more than enough to get the heart pounding. The hot baths, big enough for a half-dozen people, never feel crowded (especially since no one can talk). But even here, there is none of the exclusivity normally associated with spas; the supplemental health insurance carried by two-thirds of Cana-

dians often covers spa and massage treatments, so the services are available to a broad range of customers, young and old.

After a cycle of hot and cold, the center of the experience is the dimmed "Zero Stress" room, where people sprawl on cushions and pillows scattered around the room. As at Strom, several types of massage services are available, from relaxation to bruising deep-tissue, for additional charges ranging up to \$250 for two-hour treatments.

Despite its central location, once inside you're a world away from the clatter and noise of city streets. But once you emerge, there's another Canadian treat — Queues de Castor, or Beaver-Tails, a Northern version of fried dough — just down the street to jolt you back to reality.

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### **KICK OFF SUMMER AT SEA**

Beat the heat this summer with new adventure offerings from Boston Harbor Cruises. Hop on one of 58 vessels offering 530 daily departures, all providing cooling breezes and panoramic views of Boston from the water. Trips include a three-hour New **England Aquarium Whale** Watch with guaranteed whale sightings (or the next trip is on BHC); ferries to the Boston Harbor Islands National and State Park; the Provincetown Fast Ferry, which zips to the tip of Cape Cod in 90 minutes; a wet and wild ride on Codzilla, the "monstrously fun" boat that reaches speeds up to 40 miles per hour, with a few hairpin turns and 360-degree spins; lessons in Boston history aboard the USS Constitution Sightseeing Cruise; and ferry service to and from the City of Salem. In addition, BHC offers cruises to view the Tall Ships during Sail Boston 2017 (June 17-22). Centrally located at Long Wharf on Boston Harbor.
